

FIRE SEASON

PREPARATION



The annual fire season traditionally commences on the following

North East Sector: 1 October

South West Sector: 1 November

Fire hazards can be reduced by installing and maintaining fire breaks, reducing fine fuel loads over the property, creating, and maintaining protection zones around buildings, and hazard specific fire breaks around hazards such as wood piles or fuel depots.

The responsibility is always on the owner or occupier of the land and not contractors hired to do the works.

If you intend to hire a contractor to prepare or maintain your land. it is recommended you book them at the earliest opportunity and not leave it until the beginning of the fire season.

The Fire Management Notice, which sets out the requirements for property owners and occupiers, is published each year in a local newspaper circulating the district, in the Western Australian Government Gazette and on the City of Albany Website.

Fire Management Notices are subject to change and owner/ occupiers are recommended to obtain a copy of the Fire Management Notice published for the current year.

Owners and occupiers who wish to apply for a variation to the Fire Management Notice must put their application in writing and submit it to the City of Albany by the 31 October. Variation application forms can be obtained from the North Road administration building or on the City of Albany website.
